Turkey on the Brink: Assessing the Uncertainties of the Erdogan Era Professor Ryan Gingeras Naval Postgraduate School (NPS) Friday, February 17, 2017

After years as a thriving democracy, Turkey was considered a hopeful bridge between the East and West. Together with its strategic location and anticipated membership in the European Union, Turkey has been a focus of international attention. However, more recently the government of President Recep Tayyip Erodogan has taken an increasingly autocratic turn. This was exacerbated by a failed coup attempt in July of last year. Mr Er-

dogan has accused Fethullah Galen, a Pennsylvaniabased cleric, for masterminding the coup attempt. Since then we have seen an unprecedented purge of the President's political enemies, arrest of opposition politicians, and an assault on political liberties, the media and civil society.

Our guest, Professor Ryan Gingeras, will discuss the



dramatic post-coup developments in Turkey, whether the government can sustain its democratic culture, and how Mr. Erdogan's new policies are affecting Turkish foreign relations, including security cooperation with Russia.

Ryan Gingeras is an Associate Professor in the Department of National Security Affairs at the Naval Postgraduate School. An historian and specialist on Turkey and the Ottoman Empire, he joined the faculty

of NPS in 2010. He is author of several books on the history and politics of the Turkish Republic and the Middle East. His most recent book is entitled, *Fall of the Sultanate: World War I and the End of the Ottoman Empire* (New York: Oxford Press, 2016). Professor Gingeras earned his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Toronto.
